

personally came and were present, Alexander Henry,  
of Montreal aforesaid Trader, on the one part  
& James Milne, of the said place, Clerk, of  
the other part, who declared that they had made  
and concluded the following Agreement viz:

That the said James Milne hath hereby  
doth engage and agree to and with the said  
Alexander Henry to serve him in the Capacity  
of a Clerk for and during the space and term  
of six years from the date hereof, whether  
in either of the Cities within the respective  
Provinces of Lower & Upper Canada, or in the  
interior parts of the upper Province of Canada  
aforesaid, where the Fur trade is usually  
carried on, during all which time the said  
James Milne, the said Alexander Henry  
faithfully shall serve, his secrets keep, his  
lawful commands gladly obey when obeyed  
he shall do no damage to the said Alex:  
Henry nor see it to be done by others without  
apprising him thereof, with his own Goods  
nor the Goods of others he shall not trade  
or traffic without the consent and  
approbation first had and obtained  
from

from the said Alext Henry, that he shall not  
at any time absent himself from the said  
Alext Henry's service without his leave, but  
in all things behave and demean himself  
as an honest faithful diligent Clerk  
ought to do. And the said Alext Henry  
on his part for the consideration of the due and  
faithful discharge of the said James  
Milner's duty, hatt and hevly doth  
engage and agree to and with the said  
James Milner, that he will feed him in  
sufficient meat, Drink, waring apparel &  
lodging during the said term of Four years  
whether in Town or Country as aforesaid;  
where the said Alext Henry may require  
the said James Milner's attendance to discharge  
his duty - and further at the Expiration of  
the said term of Four Years, upon the due  
discharge of duty on the part of the said  
James Milner, the th: said Alext Henry, shall by  
hinds and obligeth himself to pay or cause  
to be paid unto the said James Milner  
the sum of Twenty five Pounds Walllyer  
Currency, the same whereon to be paid to be  
in full for the said James Milner's wages

# Alex. Henry's Travels.

Notes taken from Travels & Adventures of W<sup>l</sup>. Alex. Henry, published 30 October 1809. N<sup>o</sup>. 83. W<sup>l</sup>. Henry was attached to Gen. Amherst's Army when in 1760 he came down the St. Lawrence from Oswego on Lake Ontario & captured Montreal.

On their way down the dangerous rapids of "les Pedres, from their ignorance of the proper channels they lost several batteaus laden with provisions, ammunition, &c and 100 men. W<sup>l</sup>. H. lost three batteaus of his own laden with merchandise.

Chap 1., p 12. Aug 3<sup>rd</sup> 1761. He sent off his canoes from Montreal to Lachine. His canoes were 5½ fathoms long, extreme breadth 4½ ft. carried 60 pieces or parcels (various merchandise fitted for the Indian trade) from 90 to 100 lbs weight forming with the baggage (men's private bags, which served as portmanteaus) & provisions to Mackinac about 4 tons' weight — and crew of 8 men. Reached Mackinac in the beginning of September.

Page 77 to June 4<sup>th</sup>, 1763. The Indians on this day, from a well concerted place devised by the memorable Pontiac, a chief at Detroit, took the fort of Mackinac, & finally killed Major Thrington and about 100 troops, besides several English gentlemen, traders, W<sup>l</sup>. Henry was finally saved after dangers & escapes vastly less credible than fiction. History true. (Chap 14<sup>th</sup> p. 117) Acct. of W<sup>l</sup>. Henry's first formal interview with the Indians of Michilimackinac Sept. 1761. At two o'clock in the afternoon, the Chippeways (Sautens) came to my house about 60 in number. They walked in single file, each with a tomahawk in one hand & a knife in the other, naked from the waist upwards a few excepted who carried a blanket loosely thrown over their shoulders. Their faces blackened with charcoal their bodies with white clay. Some with rings thrust through the bridge of the nose, others with feathers in bunches on their

heads. It may well be imagined what were my sensations at the approach of this encounter, if not frightful assemble. The Chief entered first - the rest followed who, on a signal from him seated themselves on the floor. The chief, Mina-va-va-nah was about fifty years of age, six feet high, his countenance an indescribable mixture of good and evil, looked steadfastly at me where I sat in state with two interpreters one on each side & several of my men (Canadian) behind me. After gradually smacking their pipes, the chief conversed with Mr. Campion, my associate, & remarked that "the English ~~were~~ do indeed seem to be brave men, not afraid of death, since they dared to come so early, as I had done, among their enemies. The chief, Mina-va-va-nah, rose with a few strings of wampum beads held in one hand and thus addressed me

"Englishman, it is to you I speak - listen to me. - Englishman, you know the French King is our father - He promised to be such; & we, in return, promised to be his children. His promise we have kept. Englishman, it is you who have made war with this, our father. You are his enemies. How then can you lecture <sup>and</sup> judge us, his children? Are you ignorant that his enemies are ours?" Englishman, we are informed that the King of the French is old & infirm, & that being fatigued with making war upon your nation is fallen asleep and during this interval you have possessed yourselves of Canada. But this sleep will soon be ended. I think I already hear him stirring & inquiring for his children. The Indians & when he does awake what will become of you? He will destroy you utterly! Englishman though you have conquered the French, you have not conquered us! We are not slaves! These lakes, these forests, & these mountains have descended to us from our ancestors. They are our inheritance & we will part with them to no one. Your nation suppose that we, like the white people, cannot live without bread, - and pork - & beef! Do you not know that the Great Spirit & Master of life has

provided food for us in these lakes & in the woods & mountains?"  
"Englishman, our Father the French King employed  
our young men to make war upon your nation. In these wars many  
have been killed; & it is our custom to retaliate until such times  
as the spirits of the slain are satisfied. But the spirits of the slain  
may be appeased into two ways; the first is by pouring out the  
blood, the blood of those by whom they were slain; or, by covering  
the bodies of the dead, & thus to allay the resentment of their  
surviving friends. This is done by making presents."

"Englishman, your King has never sent us any presents,  
nor entered into any treaty with us. — Therefore he & we are  
still at war; and until he does we must consider that we have  
no father, nor friend among the White men than the French  
King. But for you we consider that you have natural life among  
us with the expectation that we would not molest you. — You do not  
come armed with the intention of making war on us: — You come  
in peace to trade with us, to supply us with the necessities of life  
we are in want. We shall regard you therefore, as a brother and  
you may sleep tranquilly, without fear of the Chippeways. —  
As a token of friendship, we present you with this pipe to smoke."

A Curious  
Circumstance  
June 2<sup>nd</sup> 1763


Shortly after my arrival at Mackinac, the  
preceding year a Chippeway, named Wawatam,  
began to come frequently to see me showing with  
demonstrous strong marks of personal regard.

After continuing this for sometime, he came to see me one day bringing  
his whole family with him and a large present of fur, sugar,  
& dried meat. He laid the whole in a heap & addressed me thus, "Some  
years ago I observed a fast keeping myself according to the custom  
of my nation to solitude & mortification of the body in hopes  
of obtaining from the Great Spirit protection thro' all my days.  
That on this occasion he had dreamed of having adopted an  
Englishman as his son, brother, and friend; and that the moment  
he first beheld me he recognized me as the person the G. Spirit sent out

to him & to a brother & hoped I would not refuse his present & the world  
would never consider me as one of his family. Soon after this he went off  
for his winter hunt. A Malbecomone had now passed since this  
occurrence (June 1762) & I had almost forgotten all about him. Then  
on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of June 1763, he again came to my house but in a  
temper of mind visibly melancholy & thoughtful, and without an-  
swering in a direct manner my enquiries as to his health &c. He  
said he was very sorry to see me here returned from the South (St. Mary's  
) that he intended to go to that place with all his family on the morrow  
entreated me to accompany him. He had been much disturbed during  
the winter with the noise of evil birds", if the Commandant had  
heard the news? That there were numbers of Indians looking about &  
never showed themselves in the fort. "Altho' I had now made such progress  
in the Indian language as to be able to converse tolerably with them, it is  
so extravagantly figurative I paid not sufficient attention. After  
long, painful & ineffectual efforts to prevail on me to follow them  
they left me with tears in their eyes. (This is a phenomenon in  
the Indian character) Sometimes we may see their eyes humid but  
very rarely. That night I thought seriously of Ma-wataca's urgent  
requesting me to leave with him for the South, the numbers of strange  
Indians that flock'd in, the current report of the destruction  
of all the English, but could not bring myself to believe it. I at last fell  
asleep - & the next morning, 4<sup>th</sup> June, was ushered into the  
last sign of the dreadful tragedy, so near at hand, in which I was  
to have such a share!!! The Indians to a great number collected  
& divided into two parties to play the game of lacrosse. Major  
Mervington, of the — was invited to see the game as also the soldiers  
& all the English. I was writing some letters for Montreal. Hearing  
the "war cry" I went to the window & saw the Indians prospecting down  
& scalping all the English. I seized my gun & run out as soon as  
I should hear the drum beat the alarm — but no, the Major  
so absolutely ridiculed the idea of an attack that when M<sup>r</sup>. Ducharme,  
& others told him of it he menace'd to put the first person who should  
hereafter dare to mention it. I leaped over the low fence between Langlade

& me & found the whole family at the window gazing out upon  
the scene of blood before them. I asked Langlade for a place  
to hide myself. he returned to the window shrugging his shoulders  
saying. "que boulez vous que je faire?" But a Pawnee woman  
, a slave of Langlade's beckoned me to her. I followed. She opened  
a door leading to the garret, & shutting it bolted the key. thro'  
an aperture I saw the dead, scalped & mangled, & the dying writhing  
with shrieks under the knife & tomahawk. The Indians scoop  
ing up the blood with both hands & drinking it. Soon, a last cry,  
"All is finished." At the moment I heard several Indians enter & enquire  
for me, if there were any Englishman in the house. Langlade said  
he knew not, but they might look & brought them to the garret door. As  
they were delayed a few moments for the key. I hid myself in a heap  
of bark dishes used for collecting <sup>rags</sup>. They ~~had~~ <sup>were</sup> themselves entered  
before I had time to completely hide myself, four men with tomahawks  
still dripping with blood! They went round the garret several times  
& one was so near that I almost thought he touched me. There  
was a feather bed underneath I laid - a shower of rain coming <sup>now</sup> Langlade  
came up to stop some leaks & was surprised to see me. He told me  
not to be uneasy for as most of the English were killed I might escape  
At my desire, she sent me a little water to drink. Thus, I passed the  
night as one must suppose. The next morning I heard again several Indians  
enter telling Langlade they had not found me among the dead  
Therefore I must be hid somewhere. Mr. Langlade becoming alarmed for her  
own safety got him to show me. They came up thinking my room  
now sealed. I rose & presented myself to them. Winnoway,  
, a chief, half drunk, seized me by the collar, with a large curving  
knife in his hand. Staring at me steadfastly in the eyes, for a  
few moments, he said "I will not kill you"; that he had been in gre-  
at fear & trouble, & had taken many scalps. That he had lost  
one brother & I should be named after him, Massiniegan, (i.e. paper  
, book or any material to write upon) He wanted to take me to his  
tent, but Langlade prevailed upon him to leave me there, as they  
were all drunk, until he could find another opportunity to take

me away I returned to the garret, but had hardly been there an hour when one of the Indians who had accompanied Winoway just before, returned for me saying I must follow him Langlade, too, said as I was no longer my own master I must obey. But before going out he told me to pull take off my clothes which he immediately put on & I being naked had to take his. He drove me before him. But on getting the way to the camp, he seized me by the arm & dragged me about fifty yds to some sand hills apprehending his intention to murder I refused to proceed further, & said I had rather cut off the Miller's head, & drive his wife to kill. I gave his hand a twist & in parrying the blow sent him a distance from me and ran with all my might to the Fort, where, seeing Winoway, I ran to him for protection, & after running two or three times round him, made for Langlade's door which was open, & where, after I had entered, he left me. I returned to the garret, thinking that whatever further trials might await me, Providence at all events intended to save me. About ten o'clock at night I was again called down stairs - I went, to my most agreeable surprise - it was to see Major Etherington, Lieut. Leslie & Mr. Bostwick. These gentlemen had been taken prisoners the day before, while looking at the game, & the Chiefs fearing they might be killed in the drunken frolic they intended to have sent them to the Fort under guard of the Canadians. Lieut. Lemire & twenty soldiers had been killed, & but twelve Englishmen, including soldiers, remained now alive! We passed the night together in mutual condolence & had come to the determination to regain the Fort seeing that the Indians were all drunk & outside the Fort. But the Dutch missionary whom we consulted advised us not, as in case of failure, it would exasperate the Indians still more & no dependence could be placed on the Canadians! Thus thro' the Major's folly the massacre occurred & tho' his incapacity the means of safety were neglected. W<sup>r</sup>. Tracey was the only English trader who lost his life at the capture of the Fort. Mrs. & Dr. S. Blomond & Henry Bostwick were taken by the Ottawas, & at the peace, were taken to Montreal & ransomed. Of ninety four so, seventy were killed - the rest were ultimately liberated.

In 1776 The Provincial Parliament passed a Bill, to which however the Royal Assent was not given till too late, but which finally passed into a law in 1799, granting certain duties to the Crown, whenever the British Act 14 Geo 3 c. 80 / and 14 Geo 3 c. 83, which was the Quebec Act partially repealed, & partially confirmed by the 31 Geo 3 c. 31 / should be repealed. The produce of these duties would amount to £1 or £2,000 £. and among them £. 1000 would be independent of the Legislature, though Dr. Cawther (p. 166) expresses some hesitation on

the point. The British Act  
however has never been repealed,  
and consequently the Provincial  
Act has never come into force.

My dear Sir I have just returned from St Louis (and have  
rec'd. for the first time, Letters & papers from my Canada friends  
which contain an advertisement of yours, & not doubtting  
but you will be pleased to hear of your distant friend  
I shall give you a short detail of my adventures in the  
far west, when I left St. John's I came directly to  
Chicago in Company with Mr. Peck, we remained there







## CONDITIONS OF POLICIES.

- I. Persons desirous of making Assurances, must sign a Proposal, giving reference to the usual Medical Attendant, and to two Private Friends of the Party to be Assured, and the Proposer and Referee must state all particulars in regard to the health and habits of the Party to be Assured. The statements so made shall form the Basis of the Contract, and if these statements, or any part thereof, are not truly and fairly stated, the Policy following thereon shall become void, and all Premiums paid thereon shall be forfeited.
- II.
