

wife, his universal legatee, and doth hereby revoke and annul all wills, Testaments & Codicils which he may have made before the present, which he declares to be his true last will and testament.

That it was made, done, named and dictated word for word by ~~the said Testator~~
to W^m Burn one of the undersigned Notaries in



They are published with the belief that they will focus the attention of all Canadians on the great past and still greater future of their country, to which they and their children are heirs, and for whose welfare they should all work together.







































satisfying. The notice in the Star was the

poorest; I send you a copy of the
local liberal paper - or rather two
copies, - that of last week giving a
full account of the Festival, and
that of this week cite Albert
Stevens & Remond preached on the
occasion in full. All this is of
course gratifying to me - and the
more so because I never gave in for
a moment to popular clamour or
popular cries.

I am the more pleased to
receive your letter from the fact
you refer to, the sacred tie of
friendship which through your dear
departed brother bound all his family
to my heart. Dear fellow what honor!

The remembrance of such as he was in his life, and the hope
of reunion with such is not the last post of our Christian
hope. You too have suffered, - not a little, - and
have therefore a right to share in the consolation. May you
do so ever more and more!


The Roman Catholic Church at Oka.

One of the oldest and most noticeable landmarks on the Ottawa River up to a few days ago, was the old church at Oka. It was built one hundred and fifty years ago, on the removal of the Indian tribe from Sault-~~aux~~ Recollect to the present village of Oka. The Indians have a tradition that they gave many stacks of beaver skins to pay for it, and for many years rendered valuable services as its defenders. Until 1847 it was a post of the Hudson Bay Company, and here crews were enlisted to convey the Company's officers and goods to the north-west. The cause of the fire is, so far, enveloped in mystery, and every person seems to have a theory of his own. The greatest loss will be that of a valuable library, in which were some ancient music books in which square notes were used, and a large collection of books in Indian languages, that had been collected by the indefatigable energy of Father Cusay, who took a deep interest in the Indians and Indian matters. One of the chief objects of the scenery was and still is a remarkable clump of trees in front of the church, whose low-hanging limbs have a remarkable resemblance to an enormous bear slowly entering the water. This clump was known as "The Bear", and although a portion of it was


