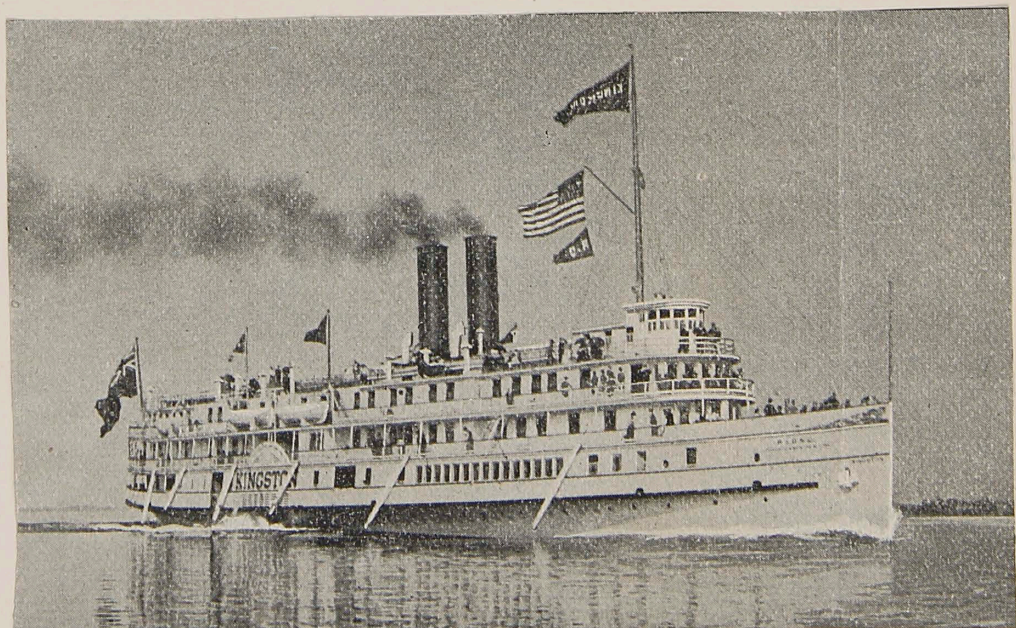
A PLEASING EVENT.

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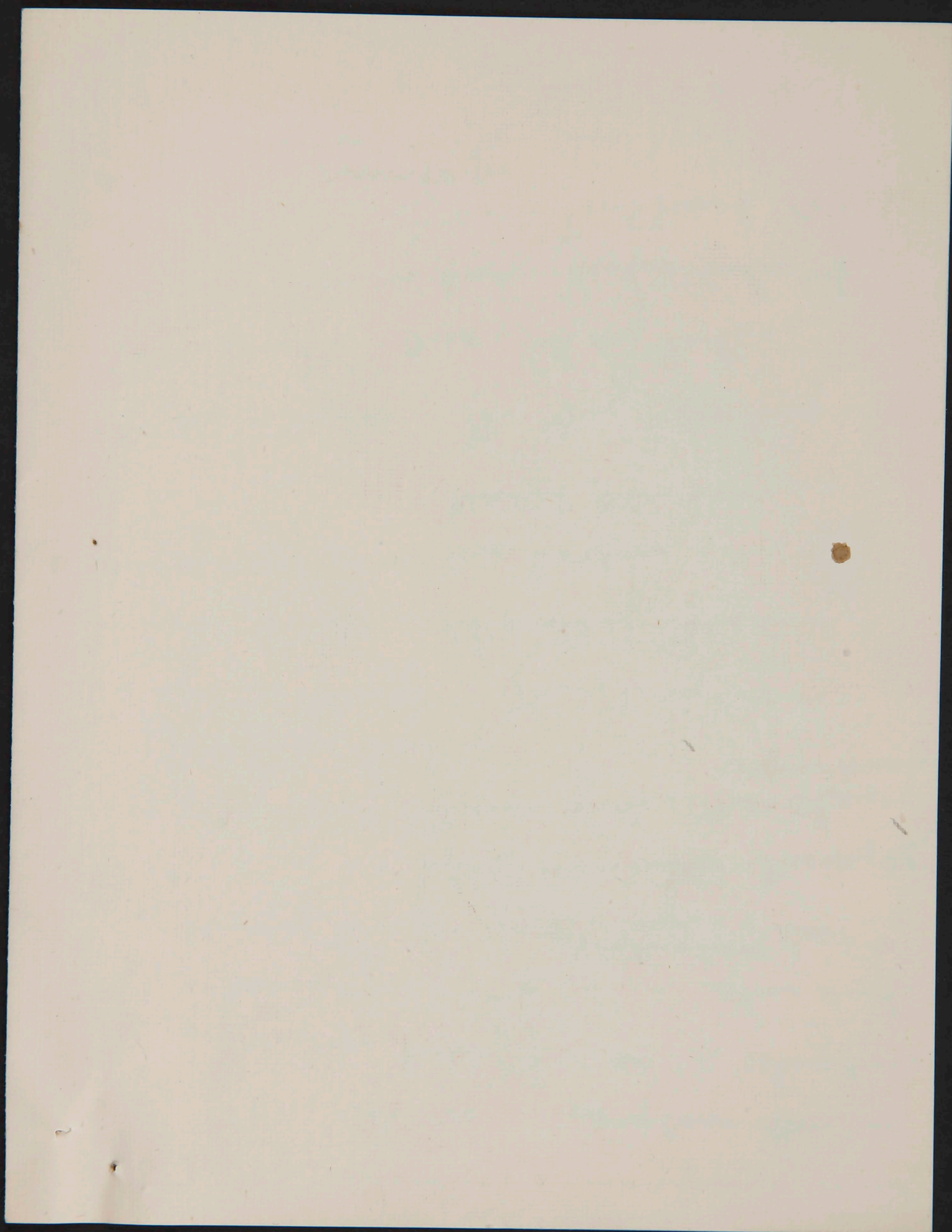

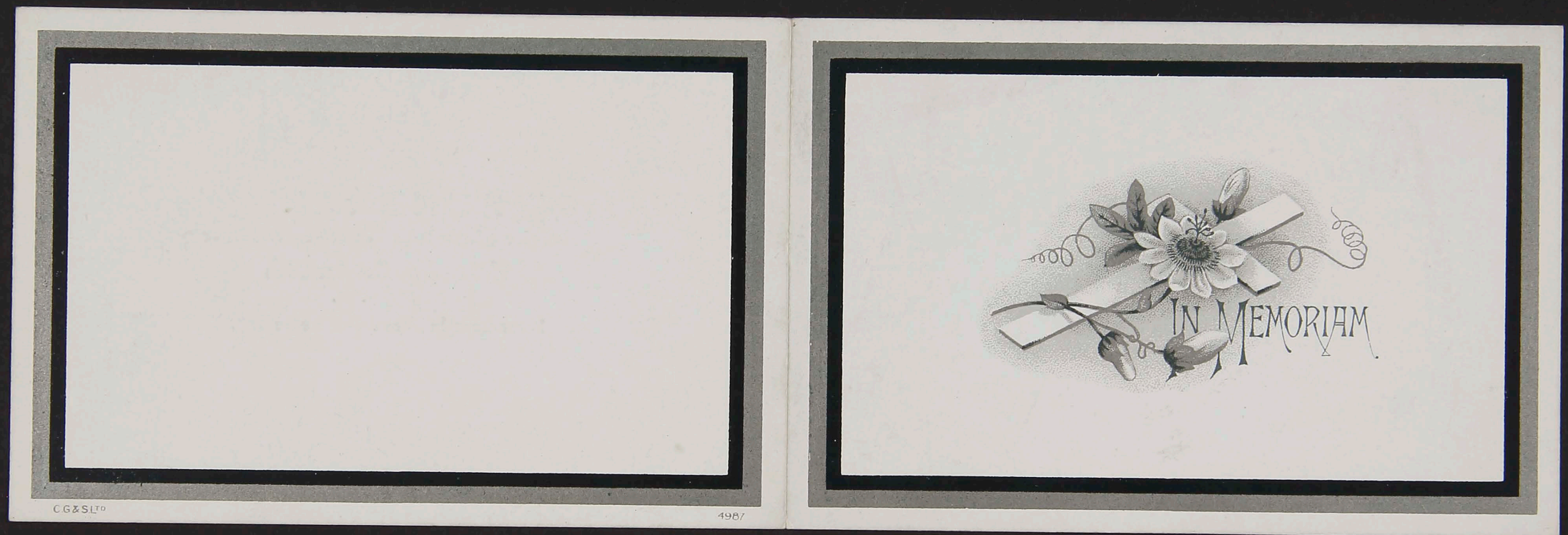

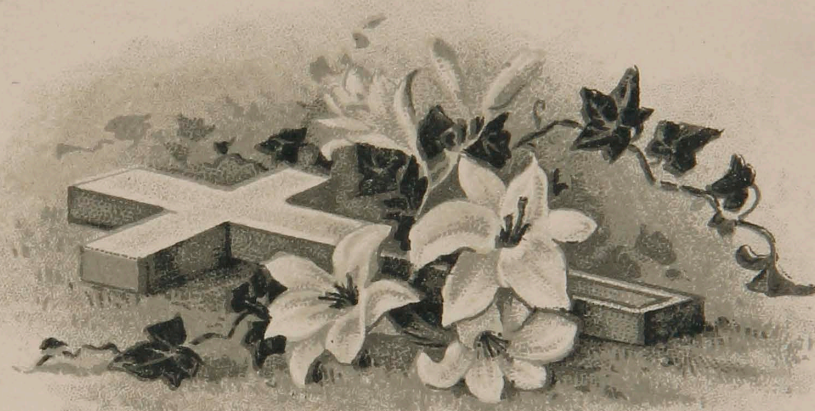

(IX-21) GIDEON VINCENT CHRISTY and MARY CUNNINGHAM m. 24 November 1867.

Gideon Christy was born 06 September 1839, the son of Stewart Christy and Elizabeth Vincent. Gideon was born in the Christy homestead, on a bush farm back of Bloomfield. He died 13 December 1912, having suffered a stroke of paralysis on 17 January 1909 and never having recovered from it. His obituary, in the Picton Gazette, gave his address as Bloomfield, and had this to say about him:

"Mr. Christy was an exemplary citizen and highly respected by all who knew him. He was a member of the Society of Friends, and a life-long Conservative in politics. He was well known as a progressive, and thorough, farmer and stock-raiser, and was identified with Farmer's Institute work in this County for some years. His funeral on Sunday, December 15th was largely attended. Service was at the house, by Rev. Mr. Spencer of Bloomfield."

Mary Cunningham was born 1847, the daughter of William W. Cunningham and Sarah Waring. She died on 26 October 1913, at Kingston, Ontario. She and Gideon were buried in Glenwood Cemeery. Three children were born to them:

James, son of William Dartrin Anglin and Sarah Frances Baker (nicknamed "Fanny" was born 20 February 1876 at Kingston, Frontenac County, Ontario. He and Florence were married by William Sparling of the United Church in Bloomfield. Witnesses to their marriage were: John King Chambers of Toronto and Bertha Brown of Bloomfield, Ont.

J. Penrose Anglin graduated from McGill University in Montreal, with a Bachelor of Science degree in Architecture. Immediately after graduation he formed his own building construction company which became known as "Anglin-Norcross". He practiced "building construction" all his working career.

The firm of Anglin & Norcross designed, and built, the central tower for the "Chateau Frontenac" in Quebec City, and to this day it is still considered a landmark accomplishment, being one of the few times something new was added to an old building successfully. The Royal York Hotel, Toronto, and the Supreme Court, Ottawa, were among other buildings built by Anglin-Norcross. J. Penrose Anglin died 15 May 1932 at Westmount, Province of Quebec. He was buried in the Mount Royal Cemetery in Montreal.

Florence, the daughter of Gideon Vincent Christy and Mary Cunningham, was born 16 January 1879, in Bloomfield. ^{a member of The Society of Friends (Quaker)} She died 10 March 1953 in Montreal and was buried at Mount Royal Cemetery in Montreal. ^{she attended Collegiate High in Kingston, then received a Bachelor of Letters Degree from Swarthmore College, PA, 1900.} Florence and Penrose had five children:

Then there was James Penrose, the "Toe" of the triumverate. Mother believed every boy should have a trade; but Pen was her only success among the three. Carpentry was his choice and he learned the trade under apprenticeship in Kingston and with, his boss, went to Milwaukee after its big fire in 1892 and from there to Chicago and its building boom getting ready for the World's Fair in 1893. Pen remained for the full term of the fair working for Joseph Allan Baker and Sons, in their exhibit of confectionary and baking machinery, first in setting up their exhibit and later taking over the making of ice cream which was sold in a restaurant on the premises at 20 cents a dish. Returning to the Kingston C.I., he completed his matriculation and spent one year at Queen's. As it could not then offer him the course that he wished, he entered McGill, with some help from the executors of father's estate. However, he worked summers, as supervisor for the Bank of Montreal in the construction of its head office. Later the Bank placed him in charge of a new Department of Architecture and he designed and supervised the building of several branches throughout the West. During these years that Hedgewood property had been rented to Prof. Ferguson, the furniture mostly stored in the hay loft, and mother and Edna moved to Montreal to keep house (and boarders) for Penrose. However, in 1902, Pen married Florence Christy who had lived in Hedgewood while attending the Collegiate, and mother and Edna moved, with some furniture, to live with Bert, first at St. Thomas and then Essex. (Mother was with us in Essex while Ruth was a baby; but became ill with what the local doctor called enlargement of the liver, and then went to Nettie's in the Toronto Metropolitan parsonage.)

In the meantime Penrose severed his connection with the Bank of Montreal and set up a construction firm, first with a partner, Byers, and then in his own company "Anglin's Limited" which later amalgamated with the Canadian end of the American Norcross company to form the "Anglin-Norcross" company which at the time of his death, in 1932, was well at the top of the construction companies of Canada.

Penrose was a man of large ideas and broad outlook. For a time he teamed up with other leaders in Great St. James to address laymen in a number of other churches. He conceived the idea of uniting all firms interested in construction in a "Canadian Construction Association", and became its first President. An oil painting of him hangs in its new building in Ottawa. Penrose also formulated a proposal, during the depression of '29 and '30, for a government plan to prevent its recurrence and presented it at Canadian Chamber of Commerce meetings.

Penrose was a man of warm family affection. He was devoted to his mother in her later years. He helped George get on his feet more than once, helped his widowed sister, Nettie in securing a burial plot on Mount Royal, and in selecting a summer home at Dorval, and he invited Brother Bert to join a family party on a trip through the Adirondacks and White Mountain Region when he greatly needed a holiday after sixteen years heavy toiling as Registrar. He introduced Bert to golf and presented him with a bag of clubs. That relaxation was a 'Godsend' in preparing Bert for the new job of High School Inspector. When the depression slackened his firm's business, Penrose said "Hurrah", to his family, wife, five children and a nephew, "Let us take a holiday while we have the money", and off they went for a grand time in Bermuda. This was a priceless memory to leave with them after his sudden death in 1932. He died on a trail between two lakes, with business associates, owners of the fishing preserve, while he was on his first fishing trip with them. At the time of Penrose's death, the five children were: Frances, 28, Mary 26, James and Jean, twins, 20, and William G. 12.

After Penrose's death, Florence carried on bravely for 23 years and had the satisfaction of seeing all five children happily married, well established in life, and, among them, raising ten grandchildren.
