

Thursday  
Kennebunkport, Me., 15<sup>th</sup> August 1889 —

My dear Son — I have today to acknowledge the receipt of your two welcome letters — I can quite appreciate your difficulty in making up your mind about your trip — it is quite a serious undertaking, to start so far from home with your family, but of course health is above everything else, but it does seem rather a precarious time, when there is so many important things at stake, that I really don't know what is best to advise you say you would like to see me, but that would not alter any of the facts of the case — but if you would like to turn down here for a few days, perhaps as long as there. Clara would not mind you could, go from Magog to Shrubwack and take the G Trunk train (any train) which leaves Shrubwack 11<sup>2/3</sup> AM arriving at Portland at 5<sup>1/2</sup> PM — get a return ticket. Certainly if you all are not going away you & Clara should have gone to some sea side place for a few weeks this summer. Georgetown is not a sufficient change of air or scene, — how would you like to take the Parisian Oct 3<sup>d</sup> and go over yourself for a few weeks returning before Christmas, I know you

dont like travelling alone; and of course it  
is a risk, and not pleasant - but you would  
get the sea voyage all the same. - As to the  
trip to B. Columbia, that would be all  
right if you only wanted a little trip, but that  
is not a sea voyage. - as to the nurse I would  
not let that keep you if other things suited, I  
dout think there would be any trouble, and  
I think it would be better to get a person who  
had travelled before ayd had some experience  
by advertising, or Mrs McRobbie or some of these  
nurses homes - Mrs Tom Molson, had a professional  
nurse same price as an ordinary girl -  
As to your house, as soon as you decide you  
should advertise at once, but you might  
not be able to rent it till 1<sup>st</sup> November and  
the kind of Tenant is more important than the  
price, I would not ask too much, & from  
\$ 50 to 75 per month - you could put away  
some of your best things, ornaments &c &c - I  
think as you say Frank has had no experience  
but he is better than nobody in the office, but  
I think we would have to have to get the old man  
to attend any important repairs, but perhaps  
there would not be much to be done, at present -  
but in conclusion, I have only to say that  
you will have to consult with Clara and  
decide for yourselves, it is quite an important  
undertaking, and no one would like the  
responsibility of advising you too strongly, -  
but if you think you can manage it, perhaps  
it might be desirable, at any rate you might  
do all you can in the mean time, and  
then as the time approaches you can see how  
matters look, perhaps the way will be made

I was so pleased to receive your very kind letter yesterday, and to hear that you were all well. (D. C.) What a blessing to be able to get away from Montreal during this fearful, heated spell. The Mortality, (as we see by the papers) has been awful, particularly among children, here even if it is summer we generally have a nice cool wave off the ocean, - I notice what you say about the anniversary of your dear Father's death. We shall never forget it and as you say, was at the time

the greatest calamity that  
apparently could have  
happened to us. Particularly  
to you, young as you were  
and so inexperienced in

Dear Brother,

We were prepared to accept Mr. J. S. Thomson's offer of \$5-00 per foot for the whole frontage (17 lots) on St. Lawrence Street, when your letter of Nov. 6<sup>th</sup> reached us and we declined his offer. We were to have paid \$300.<sup>00</sup> per lot down - amounting to \$5100.<sup>00</sup> cash and the balance about \$35000.<sup>00</sup> at 6 per cent interest, to be paid within five years. We intended putting up stores on the whole frontage which would have improved the rest of the property. The fact of Thomson having bought our four lots from Bayley does not constitute him his agent. Though he may be so - if he should be, his money is as good as anyone else's. Sister sent you a pink letter from Cacoma in which we said that during your absence if we had an offer for the lots lower than the prices fixed, <sup>if the price are agreed in thinking it a good one</sup> we wished to accept it as the letter in question received no reply from you, we felt that we were justified in taking a fair offer on the lots especially as Bob said

You told him we could accept an offer "a  
Pec" of 85 cents for them - he thinks it a pity -  
Dane refused this offer, as 90 cts - in the  
Spring will not amount to as much, considering  
the loss of interest, additional assessment for fire  
and - widening of St. Lawrence Street etc. besides  
it is doubtful if we can sell at all ~~there~~, as  
Money is getting scarcer & there is not as much  
Real Estate bought - besides people know we ask  
such high prices that they do not wish to buy  
from us - we must either not sell at all, or  
sell only our proportion of the lots. Should  
we hold it until your return, we must then  
have it sold for what it will bring or have  
it divided, so that each one can sell for  
whatever price he or she thinks best - as  
if the present market for real estate should  
go down we do not wish to have the lots on  
our hands for years to come -

I suppose you know that we all wish to  
get as high a price as possible, as we are  
all equally interested in the project, but as  
the prices fixed are not more than any of the  
lots have been sold at, we do not feel that  
we are warranted in asking them or that it  
is possible to obtain them - Hoping that you will  
take this consideration into consideration what we have here said,



50 cents "en bloc" for the  
two lots. I know that  
you paid 60cts per foot  
for simple lots but as

thought perhaps it was

Bob said that you told  
him we could take less  
than the prices named  
and Mr. Mann said he  
was selling lots on Park  
Greene for July 45<sup>00</sup>  
I hesitated for a long time  
as I did not wish to make  
a sale that you would not  
appreciate, but Kate was  
in favor of selling, so  
also was Bob, and Helen  
& I did not know what  
to do but thought if we  
refused the offer we  
might be long as there is
